These past few years were an accelerator of change. Healthcare pivoted, agencies shut their doors, businesses failed, people isolated. It also prompted innovations in new business, new systems of care, and new grants emerging to reach people at most risk. Partnerships took root as a major device to lift us from 3 years of struggle. The government also responded with dollars - dollars to save organizations, public benefits, small businesses, and people.

So much yet to do - but the future is bright. We are optimistic that Brown County will continue shining as a leader in this network. This is a new landscape, and we can't go back - forward is our future with so many goods things to come. We will stay in touch, celebrate, and push for continued growth in our community - join us!

3-YEAR AGING PLAN

The 3-Year ADRC/Aging Plan was created from data collected in 2021 through surveys, small focus groups, and presentations. Once everything was compiled and organized into one report, we created five main goals that we will continue to focus on through 2024. - Family caregivers receive the support they need, in the manner that they wish, so they can be at their best during their personal caregiver journey.
- Increase understanding of Medicare options, coverage, and access to health services. Educate customers on tools and opportunities to advocate for change. Have a voice in shaping the future of health care.
- Reinvent the Nutrition Program with improved meal quality and increased access, to best meet the nutritional needs of older adults in Brown County.
- ADRC and Grounded Café will reach, engage, and serve underserved populations with use of a mobile Grounded Café.
- 5. Reduce isolation and loneliness among older adults.

In addition to these five goals, we brainstormed actions to accomplish these goals:

- Explore needs identified in the community, especially for underserved populations.
- · Provide education.
- Empower caregivers on their journeys.
- Provide opportunities to the public to learn how to advocate for yourself or others.
- Create new volunteer opportunities - harnessing people's talents and passions to help us achieve our goals.
- Partner with local resource centers and ethnic restaurants to provide a more robust scope of service.
- Translate our menu and resources into a variety of languages.



BENEFIT SPECIALISTS

Our Benefit Specialist team members are masters of all things benefits: Medicare, insurance, public programs, and more. Looking towards retirement? New to Medicare? Unsure about everything you may qualify for? They're here to answer all of your questions.

They have saved over \$7 million for county residents through education,



advocacy, and by connecting customers to money saving benefits and programs.

ADRC SPECIALISTS

In 2023, our ADRC Specialists have developed a number of innovative process improvements and programs. One of these programs is the Independent Living Support Program (ILSP). To pilot this program, we added 2.5 staff dedicated to connecting customers. ILSP was created to help Wisconsin residents remain in their homes longer. The program gives short-term (up to 1 year), flexible help for older people and people with disabilities who meet certain requirements, helping them stay in their own homes longer.

We currently have three bilingual individuals on staff who speak Spanish and Hmong. Between them, they've provided over 300 hours of translation services and have helped create new connections in the community!

CARING FOR THE CAREGIVERS

The Mug Club for Family Caregivers is a social support group that meets once a month - the group meets both in-person as well as online to help fit the needs of all who attend. Yearly attendance has tripled since 2021! In 2023, we had 188 attendees with an average of 16 participants each month. We also had 33 caregivers complete our Powerful Tools for Caregivers workshop.

DEMENTIA

Our Dementia Care Specialist (DCS) not only meets with customers to discuss dementia tools and resources, but she is also involved with a number of community projects.

In 2023, we had a lot of amazing "firsts" within our organization and the community. In addition to the English Memory Screens, this year, we were able to offer them in Spanish, something only one other county in the state does.

Helping individuals create a baseline for their memory to monitor future changes.

It was also the first time in many years that Memory Cafés were offered throughout the entire year for the county. Memory Cafes are a wonderful way for those living with the early stages of dementia and their caregivers to get together, socialize, or do fun projects.

The Longest Day: Raising
Awareness for Dementia event was
held for the first time in June 2023.
Throughout the week of June 17,
ADRC and community partners held
events, presentations, and provided
education to the public regarding
dementia. It was a great opportunity
for community members to learn
something new and have fun while
doing it!





PREVENTION

Our prevention programs educate and empower older adults and adults with disabilities in our communities to stay active and healthy. With over 220 events throughout the year and over 2,500 attendees, we're teaching community members about a range of subjects including fall prevention, managing diabetes, advance directives, and so much more.

GROUNDED CAFÉ



Beginning in July, the cafe temporarily closed down so we could

create a new layout and add new adaptive equipment to the kitchen. To finish it off, a fresh coat of paint was applied and new signage created.



When we

re-opened, not only did the kitchen get a refresh, but so did our menu! We wanted to venture back to our roots and make sure we are serving fresh and local items - as well as bring back some old favorites.



Through a job skills training program, Grounded Café provides opportunities to breakdown stereotypes of "old" and "disabled" individuals. By coming together, we focus on strengths and abilities!

GROUNDED ON THE GO: Fully accessible food truck

We were gifted an amazing opportunity from the David L. and Rita E. Nelson Family Fund within the Community Foundation for the Fox Valley Region. This incredible grant allowed us to collaborate with local companies to build a completely customized, and fully-accessible, food truck for Grounded Café and ADRC.

With help from local organizations, we were able to prepare the food truck for our staff and the public. UWGB Philanthropy Class and Brown County graciously awarded us grants to help with finishing touches, Options for Independent Living provided guidance and suggestions to make the inner workings of the truck fully accessible, and A&J Mobility installed the stairs and electric lift for easy access - we truly couldn't have completed this truck without support from the community!

At the end of July 2023, we officially launched Grounded on the Go: Mission in Motion. With great pride, at our very first event we provided lunch for the board of the David L and Rita E Nelson Family Fund within the Community Foundation for the Fox Valley Region. After this, the rest was history - we participated in 29 events from August through October 2023, bringing our mission (and tasty food) out into the community.



COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS

GIVE BIG GREEN BAY

ADRC & Grounded Café were chosen to participate in the 6th Annual Give BIG Green Bay event held by the Greater Green Bay Community Foundation and the Green Bay Packers. Give BIG Green Bay is an online 24-hour giving day that highlights the important work of local nonprofits.

can help through everyone's journey through life. We also hosted the Let Your Abilities Shine Cooking Contest with four teams of café trainees and local chefs.



Thanks to our amazing community, we raised over \$32,000! This allowed us to continue providing resources and guidance for older adults, adults with disabilities, and their caregivers.

STORYCORPS MOBILE TOUR

In 2023, we were honored to host the StoryCorps Mobile Tour. What is StoryCorps? From their website (storycorps.org/about), "StoryCorps is committed to the ideas that everyone has an important story to tell and that everyone's story matters." They've been collecting stories since 2003 and their collection has grown to be "the largest single collection of human voices ever gathered."



The StoryCorps Mobile Tour is an Airstream that has been converted into a recording studio



that travels across the country, stopping in different communities to collect their stories. They stopped in Green Bay, WI from August through September. Throughout their four weeks here, they recorded 110 conversations.

FOUNDATIONS

ADRC and Foundations Health & Wholeness are collaborating to offer counseling services in person at ADRC. In 2023, the therapist on-site was able to meet with 61 clients, providing services in a private and comfortable environment.



COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS

CASA ALBA MELANIE & SAGE

In April, ADRC joined Casa ALBA Melanie and SAGE to offer an opportunity for elders from the Hispanic community to come together and create a variety of art in a multitude of mediums. After the four weeks of working on their pieces, the artwork was showcased at SAGE to the public.

This program was to help not only share the stories and culture of the participants, but also give them a space to socialize and be creative.

PURPLE ANGEL TRAINING

A total of 18 trainings took place in 2023, bringing the total number of Purple Angel Trained Businesses/ Organizations in Brown County to 165! That's over 2,700 people across multiple organizations who are trained on creating a welcoming and safe environment for people with dementia and their caregivers.

DEMENTIA FRIENDLY COMMUNITY COALITION

Dementia Friends is a global movement to change the way people think, act, and talk about dementia. With 16 Dementia Friend Trainings throughout the year and 3 new Dementia Friend Champions, we gained 292 new Dementia Friends throughout Brown County in 2023!



FUTURING

At the end of 2024, additional government ARPA dollars we had been receiving will stop, but people's needs will not. As the only nonprofit ADRC in the state, we have a unique challenge and opportunity to explore more ways to integrate social innovation into our planning - Grounded Café was one such initiative.

Finding ways to integrate business principles into social programs for sustainable outcomes is our future. We can no longer rely solely on government allocations to meet the need. It is a foundation we build upon, counting on community support, donor engagement, legacy giving, grants, and foundations to help us meet the complex needs that only our local communities can address.

LEGACY GIVING

Over \$369k of our revenue is generated through donations in exchange for services (meals, workshops, caregiver support, etc.) which help offset the cost of the programs' operations. 
