For Immediate Help

24-hour Crisis Center Hotline (920) 436-8888

The Crisis Center of Family services provides free, professional, short-term counseling for any situation, including: alcohol and drug abuse, depression, relationship issues, and suicide. A counselor will talk with you about your situation and the kind of help you need.

24-hour Veterans Crisis Line (800) 273-8255, Press 1

Free and confidential assistance by phone, online chat, or by texting (#838255). If you're a Veteran in crisis or concerned about one, there are caring, qualified VA responders standing by to help 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. The Veterans Crisis Line is a free, anonymous, confidential resource that's available to anyone, even if you're not registered with VA or enrolled in VA health care.

Free assistance and connection to resources.

Veterans who are homeless or at risk of homelessness—and their family members, friends and supporters—can make the call to or chat online with the National Call Center for Homeless Veterans, where trained counselors are ready to talk confidentially 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

Benefits

There are state and federal benefits available to veterans and their families. Each program has different eligibility criteria. To find out if you are eligible, contact one of the agencies listed below.

Staff help you determine your eligibility and apply for state and federal benefits, including: service-connected disabilities, pensions, DD-214, death/burial and end-of-life, education, employment, health care, home buying, POWs, transportation, and services for returning veterans.

Application Process: Compete the CarePlus enrollment form, then email the form with a copy of DD 214 (military discharge) to Kyle Arneson. He will call the enrollees when approved withing 72 hours.

Healthcare

The Veterans Administration (VA) has an outpatient clinic located in Green Bay. This clinic provides a variety of services, such as: primary care, specialty care, mental health care and support groups, dietetic counseling, pharmacy, and assistance with benefits, including in-home care. The Green Bay Health Care Center is also a Wisconsin Alzheimer's Institute (WAI)-affiliated memory assessment clinic. *Please note: not all veterans are eligible for all VA clinic services. Call for eligibility information.*

Mental Health/Counseling

If you or a loved one is struggling to cope with the effects of combat, there are places specifically for veterans and their families to get the help they need.

HUD VASH supports long-term housing needs of veterans who are homeless or in danger of becoming homeless and are in need of care coordination. Veterans that qualify will be provided with a Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher. Veterans must be eligible for VA healthcare, within HUD income guidelines, and not be on the sex offender registry.

Veteran's Housing and Recovery Program (VHRP)

A CVI office is located within the complex with regular hours to provide free supportive services to those living in Veterans Manor.

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
